UPPER GWYNEDD TOWNSHIP BUDGET APPROVAL BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS APPROVE 2018 BUDGET

he Upper Gwynedd Township Board of Commissioners approved the 2018 budget at their December 18, 2017 Public Meeting. This budget relates to all funds of the Township including the General Fund, Sanitary Sewer Fund, and the Liquid Fuels Fund. The 2018 budget does not include a real estate tax increase. The Township is proud to announce that it will maintain the \$30,000 Homestead Exemption that many residents benefit from. This exemption reduces owner occupied residential assessed values in the amount of \$30,000, thereby reducing the amount paid to the Township. Anyone not registered for the Homestead exemption, may acquire additional information and registration forms via the Township's website.

With respect to sewer rates, the Township has not increased sewer rates. The Township's Liquid Fuels Fund outlines how the funds received by PennDOT via the State's Liquid Fuel Tax is spent. These expenditures include the milling, overlaying and micro surfacing of streets located in Upper Gwynedd Township.

The streets contained in the 2018 budget are from a list that is contained in an annual road maintenance schedule. This schedule is reviewed each year to determine whether there are streets that need attention, but are not included in the current year's plan. A list of streets included in the 2018 budget is also posted in the Township's website.

Anyone interested in seeing the Township's budget in detail, may do so by visiting the Township's website at www.uppergwynedd.org, or at the Township building. The current year budget is always kept at the front desk.

It is very important for taxpayers to understand that the Township does not control the tax levy imposed by either the North Penn School District or the Montgomery County Board of Commissioners. In 2017, the Township real estate tax represented only 6.7% of your total annual real estate tax bill while the School District's tax represented 80.7%, the County tax represented 11.3%, and the Community College tax represented 1.3%.

In addition to normal operation and maintenance expenses, this Budget includes the following capital items:

General Fund: Administration: Purchase and installation of a Township-Wide document management system (\$22k) and the replacement of the accounting software (\$150k); Facilities: Replacement of the Administrative & Police Building roof (\$80k-funded by Capital Reserves); Police: Replacement of one patrol vehicle (\$38k-funded by Capital Reserves) and the purchase of one automatic license plate reader (\$19k); (continued on page 2)

SEWER DEPARTMENT NEWS

n October 30, 2017 the Upper Gwynedd Township wastewater treatment plant was visited by project design engineers from British Petroleum (BP) out of Illinois. The BioMag system by Evoqua Water Technology was the primary focus of the tour. BP is exploring BioMag as an option to add to their wastewater process to increase the flow capacity for a long-term maintenance

project at one of their refineries. Leading the tour and answering technical questions on behalf of the township were Lee Honeywell, Director of Wastewater Operations, and Jim Petherbridge, Chief of Maintenance. BioMag was installed at the wastewater treatment plant in February of 2014 in order to enhance the settling capabilities of the wastewater process. It was the first of its kind in the state of Pennsylvania.





Fire Safety - "Close the Door for Life!"

s residential fires move through a home faster than ever, research has shown that simply closing your bedroom door when you sleep greatly increases your chances for survival. A closed door can provide occupants with a critical barrier against heat and smoke. It also gives them precious minutes to escape or be rescued, and also help to protect property. Underwriters Laboratories (UL) Firefighter Safety Research Institute conducted studies in July 2017 to try and show the differences between an open and closed bedroom door. In the 17 tests completed, it was determined that the room with the door closed was able to sustain life for as much as 10 minutes or longer, while the conditions in the room with an open

door was untenable within approximately 5 minutes. With the ever-increasing number of synthetic products being brought into our homes, any advantage provided for you, your family and firefighters is of great benefit. While we know we can't prevent every fire from occurring, if we can prevent injuries or worse, it is a win for all. For more information, please visit www.closeyourdoor.org.

Fire & Emergency: Purchase of a thermal imaging camera (\$6k); Public Works: Road milling & overlay projects (\$919kof which \$720k funded by State), Storm Water Management Projects (\$481k-of which \$168k funded by Grants), and replacement of a 1999 pick-up truck with plow (\$55k-funded by Capital Reserves); Park & Rec: Installation of lights at pickleball courts (\$54k-of which \$27k by Grants), path and parking lot paving at Garfield Park (\$30k), replace pick-up truck (\$43k-funded by Capital Reserves), and replace a mower (\$12k). Sanitary Sewer Fund: The continuation of the Inflow/Infiltration Reduction Program (\$308k-\$154k funded by Capital Reserves), various equipment / controls replacement and upgrades at Plant (\$397k-\$57k funded by Capital Reserves), and the replacement of a utility truck (\$45k).

Sanitary Sewer: *Diversion Project Fund:* The continuation of the design engineering of diversion project as well as construction starting 4th Quarter (\$2,550k-funded from Capital Reserves).

The Board of Commissioners' President Kenneth E. Kroberger thanked all the Members of the Board, Township Manager Leonard T. Perrone, Township Finance Director David Brill, Assistant Township Manager Michael Lapinski, and all Department Heads for their diligence through the Budget preparation process. Mr. Kroberger added that many difficult choices were made to develop a Budget which maintained and improved service while holding the line on costs thereby no tax increase.

SNOW EMERGENCY INFORMATION

A snow emergency shall be declared by the Township Manager and announced over the radio stations WNPV 1440 and KYW 1060. Emergency information and snow plow techniques will also be posted on www.uppergwynedd.org.



Township policy dictates a rotational plow schedule with each snowfall. This means no one neighborhood or street remains in the same position on the plow schedule. Township plows must operate at a minimum speed to create enough momentum to remove snow from the road.

- A truck with a raised plow does not mean your area has been completed.
 They may be returning to the garage for fuel, additional materials, assisting in an emergency, etc.
- The state and county are responsible for state and county roads.
- Private roads and private lanes are not the Township's responsibility.

Do your part to make the snow removal process more efficient! Follow these simple do's and don'ts of residential snow removal to help our operators remove snow with ease.

DO

- ✓ Trim back low hanging branches to allow plow operators a clear line of sight.
- Clear your sidewalk within 24 hours as it is residential property, not the Township's responsibility.

DO NOT

- X Put out trash and recycling containers.
- Park unattended vehicles on any Township roadway (Ordinance 61-2). Vehicles in the roadway will be ticketed.
- X Leave basketball stands in the street.
- X Shovel snow into the street.
- ➤ Pass a plow while on the road and stay out of the operators' blind spot.

Remember—our plow operators work diligently to clear safe roadways for Township residents. Please be patient during snowfall. For information on the plowing process, visit the Public Works Department page at www.uppergwynedd.org.

PUBLIC WORKS - ROAD REPAIRS

Ithough work may not be done on your street until later in the day, the contractor usually begins at 7:00AM. Your automobiles will need to be moved out of your driveways and off your street before this time. Proper notification will be sent to your residence prior to the work beginning, to ensure you will have ample time to move your vehicles.

If you need to get into or out of your driveway during the time that work is in progress, particularly when work is being done directly in front of your house, you may have to wait a few hours, so the material has time to properly set up. It is important that you contact the Upper Gwynedd Township Public Works Department as soon as possible if there are any unusual circumstances that warrant consideration.

The contractor and the Township will work together to reduce the inconvenience to our residents during this paving project, and we ask for your patience and cooperation.

Ralumac® micro-surfacing is a cost effective preventative maintenance technique for renewing surfaces and protecting pavements. A quick, economical surface treatment for asphalt and PCC, micro-surfacing provides a smooth, black, highly textured and durable pavement surface.

Ralumac® micro-surfacing is applied by contractors using self-contained mixing and laying equipment. The equipment continuously blends the separately loaded components in a job mix formula. It can be applied in a thin lift, it sets quickly, and the road can be reopened to traffic in about an hour. When applying the Ralumac® to the road surfaces, the contractor must overlap his paving passes to get full coverage. Depending on the width of the street, two or three passes may be required. This process causes ridges to appear at these overlaps. However, as the traffic action kneads the material, closing the surface rendering it virtually impervious. The traffic will wear down any irregularities in the paving surface and will smooth them out in a relatively brief time. Please be advised, that this road application will not look like a road that is milled and overlayed. It will leave a gritty appearance until the traffic wears down the material and smooths it out. This is perfectly normal. Townships use micro-surfacing as part of their preventive maintenance programs, and for rut filling and texturing their moderate to heavy volume roads—over both asphalt and concrete pavements. A successful Ralumac® micro-surfacing project can last from 6-9 years, depending on application and project conditions.

Overview: Planning & Zoning, Part Two

he original concept of separating various incongruent land uses and the control of the height and bulk of buildings was known as Euclidean Zoning (named for the 1926 case). These early zoning codes were focused on separating types of land uses from one another, as well as establishing patterns where business and commercial uses would be permitted. Modern-day zoning has evolved to a greater sophistication of land use regulation including required yards, building coverage and floor area ratios; special setbacks from environmental resources; the establishment of special exception uses such as for places of worship in residential districts; modern parking and loading standards; design requirements for signs, billboards, landscaping and lighting; historic district preservation and the avoidance of development in hazardous areas such as areas of steep slopes, wetlands and flood plains.

Zoning regulations have come a long way since 1926 when the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the right of municipal zoning in the landmark case of "Ambler Realty vs. The Village of Euclid (Ohio)." Over the succeeding ninety years the courts have adjudicated many aspects of zoning—curbing some aspects of land use regulation while also granting wide-reaching powers but the idea of the right of zoning has never been denied. In Upper Gwynedd, the first Zoning Ordinance was adopted in 1942.

In 1968 the Pennsylvania Legislature enacted the PA Municipalities Planning Code (originally known as Act 247), which grants powers to and establishes the rules and procedures for specific regulations such as: the adoption and enforcement of the township Zoning Ordinance and the Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance (SALDO) and the composition of the Municipal Comprehensive Plan. In addition, the Code provides for other municipal activities such as the use of impact fees, preparation and adoption of an official map and the creation of a zoning hearing board and rules for the conduct of hearings.

There are three distinct branches dealing with planning and zoning issues at the local level:

The Board of Commissioners: These are the elected officials charged with the governing of Upper Gwynedd Township. They enact zoning ordinances; decide on the approval or denial of proposed subdivisions and land developments; adopt amendments to the zoning map; and hold public hearings to consider the above as well as creating the comprehensive plan. The zoning map is based upon compliance with state and local regulations.

The Planning Commission: These

are appointed members, who must

also be township residents. They meet regularly and advise the Board of Commissioners on required actions dealing with proposed subdivisions and land developments and perform special projects such as land use updates, zoning map recommendations, preservation of historic resources, etc. The Zoning Hearing Board: These are appointed members who meet monthly to hear appeals from the Zoning Ordinance such as variances or special exceptions and challenges to a particular regulation. Procedures for the conduct of business, notification of neighbors and rendering decisions are based on the procedures established by the Municipalities Planning Code.

Code Enforcement

With the coming of spring and summer several items regarding your property and residence should be considered.

- Trees and shrubs should be trimmed so that they do not encroach on neighboring property or public streets and sidewalks.
- If you have a pool, be sure that the electric is code compliant to avoid the potential for electric shock. In ground pools require a fence with gate locks around the perimeter. Above ground pools should have a removal ladder.
- Trim shrubs away from the exterior air conditioning components to allow air exchange.
- Decks should be checked for wood decay, rot and signs of dilapidated or structurally unsafe conditions. Check that nails are securely attached to the structure. Each handrail should be graspable and should be firmly fastened and capable of supporting the load being imposed. Guards or spindles should be spaced so that a space no greater than 4 inches exists between each member. Any replacement items should be screwed rather than nailed.

ABOUT UPPER GWYNEDD PARKS

Garfield Park • 7.6 Acres

South Broad St & Garfield Ave. Lansdale This large park is home to a multi-use field and full-size baseball diamond with backdrop. Children up to 12 years old are welcome to play on the large multi-piece playground, two tot swings, two regular



swings and a climber. Garfield Park is the ideal location to have a picnic on any of the three tables or two benches.

Parkside Place Complex • 102.5 Acres

1 Parkside Pl., North Wales The Upper Gwynedd Township Municipal Building is located in Parkside Place Complex which consists of the Administrative Offices and Police Station.



The beautiful white gazebo located across from the administrative building is used in the township logo. Parkside Place Park features the Debarth Amphitheatre which serves as home to summer concert and movie showings, as well as a pavilion with picnic tables. Parkside Place Park sport facilities include a multi-use grass field, 5 tennis courts, 4 pickleball courts and two basketball courts. Parkside Place Park is also home to the Nor-Gwyn Pool and summer concession stand. The trails at the Parkside Place complex cover one mile and are comprised of two trails - the Woodlands Trail and the Parkside Trail. The Parkside trail is 1/2-mile-long and travels along the front quadrant of the complex by the pavilion, basketball courts and tennis courts. Parking is available adjacent to the pavilion and the tennis courts. The Woodlands Trail, also 1/2 mile, is in the rear of the complex. Both trails highlight our sensory garden, fitness station and butterfly garden. The park serves as the trail head for the Wissahickon Valley Watershed Green Ribbon Trail. Parkside Place is also home to Parksci Playground. In 1995, the community worked in conjunction with Leathers to build the wooden structure. The castle like structure provides children with educational elements incorporated throughout. Residents are eligible to reserve the pavilion, playground space and gazebo.

Rexdale Park • 9.2Acres

Ivy Ln. & Grannery Ln., Upper Gwynedd Rexdale Park includes multi-use equipment for children up to 12 years old. With two bucket swings and an animal rider, this is the perfect neighborhood park. With two benches located adjacent



to the playground, visitors can enjoy the tulip trees blooming in the spring season.

West Point Park • 2.1 Acres

Garfield Ave & 2nd St., West Point Located one block from the Upper Gwynedd Fire Department, this park provides multi-use play equipment, merry-go-round, tot climber, two tot



swings and two regular swings for children up to 12 years old. The park also offers as sport facilities such as a basketball court and baseball diamond with backdrop. Picnic tables are also available for public use.

Whittaker Park • 0.3Acres

Armstrong Dr. & Whittaker Pl, Lansdale With the entrance located on Eagle Lane, also known as Whittaker Place, this quant park provides green space for residents to run around the open field. Here, visitors will



find multi-use play equipment, two animal riders, two tot swings and two regular swings. A full-size soccer goal is also located in Whittaker Park. Two benches provide seating for visitors.
